## From the Principal



Welcome back to Term 2, and whilst it does seem some time ago now, I do trust that all of our families enjoyed a most happy and holy Easter. Just prior to our Term 1 holidays, we held an amazing College Day where we celebrated all that makes this community special. ## From the Deputy Principal - Learning

Term 2 has started like a whirlwind, with the unseasonally dry weather providing excellent conditions for our staff and students to get fully immersed in a range of teaching and learning experiences around the College and within the wider community. Learning has taken place in many different forms with a variety of excursions, sports activities, guest speakers and community events supplementing the daily learning experiences taking place within the classroom.

The term began with our College community gathering with members of the local parish for our **R-12 Resurrection Mass**. We took time within the Mass to acknowledge the life and work of Pope Francis, who passed away on Easter Monday, linking his legacy of compassion for the poor and deep care for our natural environment to the message of hope in our lives that we can all take from Jesus' resurrection.

## **Term 2 Secondary Learning Experiences**

Our Senior School students have been involved in a range of different learning activities, with our musicians travelling to Mt Gambier, enjoying the sounds and the atmosphere of the **Generations in Jazz Festival** and the opportunity to perform and sharing their music passion with like-minded people. Our Stage 1 Outdoor Education students braved the cooler weather during their **Bushwalking Exploration Journey** in the Deep Creek Conservation Park, and our Year 11 students engaged in their **Year 11 Retreat** experience, themed My Journey at the Woodhouse Adventure Park. The Retreat was facilitated by Sam Clear, from Walk4One and was a wonderful opportunity for students to connect with each other and their teachers, in a manner that invites positive reflection about self, others and

The Year 10 cohort recently attended the **Adelaide Careers and Employment Expo** at the Adelaide Showgrounds, providing students with an opportunity to speak with professionals involved in a vast array of careers and complementing the careers and pathways work the students do here at school. Our Year 10 Japanese students recently attended the **JLTASA Movie Making Day** at St John's Grammar School, joining with Japanese students from other schools to create a storyboard, write a script and edit a commercial (in Japanese) for an everyday item.

Our recent **Mother's Day Breakfast** was a huge success and a large part of that was the outstanding catering of our Stage 2 Food and Hospitality students who brought together all their learning from this semester to create a wonderful spread.

Just this week the Stage 2 Physics students spent a day at the **University of South Australia**, attending workshops in Momentum in Two Dimensions, Motion and Relativity and Electricity and Magnetism – work that will help broaden their understanding of the topics they are covering through their studies.

## **R-6 Learning Activities**

Our R-6 students have also been actively involved in their learning, both in and outside of the classroom. Some recent sporting opportunities included our Year 5/6 Girls 9-a-side AFL Footballers participating in the **Dublas Girls Cup** at the Summit Sport and Recreation Centre and our Year 4-6 students who represented St Francis de Sales at the **Barker District Cross Country Carnival** at Woodside. As we expect, these students were outstanding ambassadors for our College, competing in a fair and respectful manner,

whilst also exhibiting high level skills.

A number of our Junior School students have recently undertaken activities helping them to deepen their understanding of the Catholic nature of our school, including our Reception and Year 2's who visited **Our Lady of Mercy Catholic Church** and the Year 3's who shared Mass with the local parishioners, led by Father Philip Marshall.

We are very proud of the wide and diverse array of learning opportunities available to our students, and the way they actively engage in these experiences. As always, I encourage all students, with the support of their teachers and families, to set high expectations of themselves, and to continue striving for their best by continuing to push towards their next level of learning.

#### **Catholic Education Week**

Catholic Education Week was celebrated during Week 3 (12-18 May) in Catholic schools across South Australia. ## The Gift of Service

As I reflect upon our College community, I feel so proud of who we are and our living-out of "Heart speaks to Heart", which is one of the core messages of the saint, St Francis de Sales. The generosity and support that our community offers each other and the broader community, is inspiring.

There are so many examples of acts of service and outreach within our College, that it's worth highlighting some of them. Toward the end of last term, a number of our Year 11 students volunteered to participate in the annual Variety Club Adelaide Zoo Picnic. This was a very large event held for children with disabilities, and our students who attended had the opportunity to dress in mascot costumes and be a joyful presence for the children who were guests at the picnic. Lots of fun and wonderful to see the joy this created. Our College will be involved in the Variety Club Christmas Lunch later in the year too.

We also have a number of ongoing service activities that I'd like to acknowledge. Breakfast Club occurs twice a week in the Food Tech Kitchen and many students take the opportunity to come along to be with friends and have toast and Milo before school starts for the day. This is facilitated by Sr Shiji and Jade Pace, along with a number of staff and student volunteers who arrive at the College at 8:00am to begin preparing for it.

We also have a wonderful and long-lived connection with the Mt Barker Uniting Church with the *Hungry No More* program. On a regular basis, we have staff, parents and senior student volunteers attend this program on a Sunday evening, which involves serving hot dinners in the Uniting Church Hall, to a large group of homeless people and people who are struggling in life. Recently, our College has extended our assistance to the *Hungry No More* program. Under the drive of our staff member, Jodie Marafioti, any left over food from classes in the Food Tech Kitchen, gets packaged, labelled, and delivered to the Uniting Church to be distributed to people who rely on the *Hungry No More* program. This initiative has been named *Footsteps for Food* and has recently delivered over 500 meals to the *Hungry No More* program.

Fortnightly, we have our Community Mass in the Community Sports Centre Function Room, starting at 8:00am. After the Mass, staff, parents and parishioners who attend are able to enjoy a barista made coffee and have some time to sit and chat together. This is made possible thanks to our Year 5 teacher, Dan Peterson, who arrives at the College early to set up the coffee machine and then serve coffees after Mass.

This year we welcome Jennifer Delima into our community as a volunteer in our Music Ministry. Jennifer is a parishioner who attends Masses at Our Lady of Mercy Church, and she happily volunteers to assist and drive the live music that is part of our Year Level Masses each week. This involves attending planning meetings with teachers, rehearsing songs with students and driving the Music Ministry at each of the Year Level Masses. A tremendous effort.

Of course, we have our Faith-in-Action (FIA) Group, who enthusiastically promote our fundraising and awareness-raising Appeals each term, and also are involved in several outreach excursions to the Vinnies Shelters and Soup Kitchens, amongst many other things. The FIA Group consists of students ranging from Year 3 to 12, who volunteer their time to meet weekly and plan outreach events at the College and within the broader community. This group is enthusiastically led by Tayla B, Leila C-S, Toris B-K, Charlotte K and Giselle G.

Our Parent Community Group (PCG) volunteers are also a huge part of our service work within our College. I thank Lia Hooper and Aisha Sirop for their leadership of this group. The PCG recently held the annual Mother's Day Stall at the College, which was a great opportunity for students to buy their mum a gift, and it was also a successful fundraiser for future PCG initiatives for the College.

The tireless ministry and service to our community, of our Parish Priest, Fr Philip Marshall, is also a cherished part of what happens at our College on a regular basis. When all of these service initiatives are written and presented at once, its awe-inspiring to realise the many acts of love and generosity that occurs at our College on a regular basis. I know for sure that there are so many other acts of service occurring, which I haven't listed here. We are part of a beautiful community.

The greatest act of generosity from our community, I think, is definitely shown during our *Caritas Project Compassion Appeal* efforts. We concluded last term on such a high, in great celebration of who we are as a College, with our annual College Day. This day was also the culmination of our generous fundraising for *Caritas Project Compassion* during Term 1.

Our liturgy to start the day, beautifully unpacked our heritage in the Mercy Sister narrative and the life of St Francis de Sales. Our students then had the opportunity to have some fun with their friends on the jumping castles, sporting activities and the Walkathon. College Day concluded with the famous Talent Show, which was entertaining.

As a College community, once again we did an absolutely tremendous job at raising funds for Project Compassion through the Walkathon and other activities/donations. The amount we raised broke last year's College record and I'm sure is again the highest amount raised by a school in Australia. We raised a total of \$28,002.50, which is mind blowing. Thank you so much for your generosity. This will assist so many people in great need.

#### Stories of Hope

Another example of great service and generosity, is seen in the lives and works of the many Religious Congregations who set up schools and support services in the early years of the State of South Australia. Recently, I attended a seminar with Sr Shiji and students, Holly P and Tayla B. It was an opportunity to hear the stories and historical beginnings in South Australia, of several Religious Congregations, including the Sisters of Mercy, who established the first iteration of our College in 1902. Holly and Tayla share their insights about the experience:

"The Stories of Hope event connected the Jubilee Year (Pilgrims of Hope) and the 180 year anniversary of Catholic Education in South Australia. This was started by Mary MacKillop and carried through further by Brothers and Sisters from other Congregations, shaping our Catholic Education today. A particular part of the day which stood out for me was the inspirational stories that have shaped Catholic schools and the education being passed down from the Sisters and Brothers. As was highlighted in the metaphor; "everyone is a golden thread and together we create a rope of hope streaming from Jesus and his teachings". The Stories of Hope experience has shown me how much Catholic Education has changed and developed over 180 years, through ongoing support of young people's hope." Holly P

"I had the honour of joining Holly, Sister Shiji and Mr Farrugia to attend the 180th anniversary of Catholic Education at the Stories of Hope'seminar. We spent the day reflecting and discussing the history and values of Catholic Education and how it has shaped schools today. Hearing stories from the Sisters and Brothers, of their challenges and successes was both insightful and inspirational. This experience has had a profound effect on me. It reminded me of the importance of education, not just as a means of intellectual growth, but as a way of nurturing values that contribute to a more compassionate and understanding world." Tayla B

## The Legacy of Pope Francis

We are saddened by the recent news of the death of Pope Francis. However, we know that his legacy and mission will live on in our world; especially his devotion to the needs of the poorest of the poor, and commitment to taking care of our natural and living world. This week is Laudato-Si Week, where we especially focus on the message in Pope Francis' encyclical about Care for our Common Home, which was written exactly 10 years ago. On Thursday 5 June, which is World Environment Day, we will be running a Junior School and a separate Senior School Assembly, based on the theme of Ecological Conversion. This is a concept that comes out of Laudato-Si and is about recognising the need to deepen the relationship with the natural world, which we are all so interconnected with by design. Pope Francis states in the encyclical, "There can be no renewal of our relationship with nature without a renewal of humanity itself. There can be no ecology without an adequate anthropology".

The assemblies will provide students and staff with information about recycling and other aspects related to looking after our environment, and in the first instance invite people to join a College discussion group to build a whole College plan for Ecological Conversion. It is hoped that the outcome of the discussions had by this group will lead to a number of initiatives that can be actioned by students, staff and families.

Whilst our aim is to deepen our activity in caring for the environment, I'm aware that there is lots of positive work currently happening in this field at our College. We congratulate the Year 5 cohort, who won the Genesis Trophy at the end of Term 1, in recognition of their continued effort to keep their outdoor classroom environment clean and tidy. All steps in the right direction add to our combined efforts to create a world where humans and all living things flourish together.

## **Vinnies Winter Appeal**

This term our charity focus is the Vinnies Winter Appeal, which includes our Vinnies Sleepout. The Appeal assists Vinnies to **provide emergency relief to people at risk and experiencing homelessness**. ## From the Director of Students

Did you know that each of our College Houses have a significant connection to the life of St Francis de Sales? Each House reflects a significant part of the story of St Francis de Sales and on Thursday 15 May we celebrated Savoy House Day. Savoy was the first house to be celebrated as it is the birth place of St Francis de Sales.

This celebration marks the beginning of a new initiative led by our Senior Student Leadership Team, as a way to help us learn more about the life and mission of our patron saint and how it connects to our College history. House Days aim not only to educate but also to strengthen our sense of community whilst having some fun.

The day began with a story and prayer shared during Morning Prayer, highlighting the significance of Savoy. 
